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***Living a Catholic Life:
Totality and Integrity***

Man's dignity is derived from his having been created by God, and the way in which He created man is as body and soul. As Pope St. John Paul II teaches in his encyclical on moral theology, *Veritatis Splendor*, "The person, including the body, is completely entrusted to himself, and it is in the unity of body and soul that the person is the subject of his own moral acts.

Usually, the principle of totality is seen as being directed toward the preservation of the physical whole of the human body, while the principle of integrity refers to respect for the hierarchical ordering of the members of the body, the natural hierarchy of life functions, with "the values of intellect, will, conscience, and fraternity [being] preeminent" (Vatican II, *Gaudium et Spes*, N. 61).

As Pope Pius XII points out in a 1953 address to the *Congress of Psychotherapy and Clinical Psychology*, "Man is an ordered unit, one whole, a microcosm, after the fashion of a State whose charter, determined by the end of the whole, subordinates to this end the activity of the parts in the right order of their value and function." Because man is entirely good, in his lower bodily functions as well as in his higher spiritual activities, he may never be directly violated at any level of his being.

However, there can occur situations in which one must sacrifice a part of the body to preserve the life of the individual. For example, if a person has a gangrenous leg, he may need to have it amputated in order to avoid death. As the United States *Conference of Catholic Bishops' Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholic Health Care Services* teaches, "All persons served by Catholic health care have the right and duty to protect and preserve their bodily and functional integrity. The functional integrity of the person may be sacrificed to maintain the health or life of the person when no other morally permissible means is available" (dir. 29).

In a 1953 address to the *Italian Society of Urology*, Pius XII teaches that there are three circumstances in which one could surgically remove an otherwise healthy organ: (1) when the preservation of the organ would cause serious damage or even endanger the life of the entire organism, (2) when the damage could not be avoided in any other way than through surgery, and there is reasonable hope of success, and (3) when the surgery and removal of the organ or suppression of its function will lead to a diminution or elimination of the threat to the organism.

The application of the principles of totality and integrity is not quite so clear when it is a question of an individual's giving up part of his body to help another. The principle of totality does not refer simply to the anatomical wholeness or physical integrity of the body. Rather, **we may do nothing which would diminish or threaten the functional integrity of the body.** It might be that a living person would want to donate an organ to a family member or friend who is in need. It might be possible to donate some bone marrow for a transplant without hurting one's own body. Also, some organs, like kidneys, come in pairs, so that the loss of one would not significantly impair the overall functioning of the body. On the other hand, one could not donate an organ such as an eye, because even though eyes come in pairs, the elimination of one of them would severely diminish the wholesome functioning of the body.

Catholic morality is based upon a profound respect for man and for the body: "The human body shares in the dignity of 'the image of God'...and it is the whole human person that is intended to become, in the body of Christ, a temple for the Spirit" (Catechism, N.364). The principles of totality and integrity guide our actions in the care of this spiritual-bodily creature for whom God has such love.
