BLESSED AMONG US

Blessed Mary Teresa de Soubiran – Founder, Society of St. Mary the Helper (1835-1889)
Sophia Therese de Soubiran felt an early attraction to religious life. In 1864, after spending years in a community of laywomen who took temporary vows, she founded a new congregation – the Society of St. Mary the Helper, dedicated to saving souls through practical work. Houses sprang up in France and then in England, with work that ranged from the care of orphans to teaching the poor and establishing hostels for young working women.

As Mother Mary Teresa, she spent several happy years as superior of her community. But then her story took a bizarre turn. In 1871 the congregation elected an assistant mother general, Mother Mary Frances, whose charisma masked a disturbing will to power. She managed to wrest control of the congregation, deposed Mother Mary Teresa, and ultimately succeeded in having her expelled from her own congregation. She was forced to relinquish her habit and forbidden any contact with her sisters.

And so, in 1874, Mother Mary Teresa was suddenly a laywoman, forced to begin life over again. Eventually she found another congregation willing to take her in. But she suffered terribly from her dejection and from reports of the steady decline, under the usurper, of the congregation she had founded. She died of tuberculosis in 1889. Soon after this, in another strange twist, Mother Mary Frances herself abandoned the congregation. Under her successor, the memory of Mother Mary Teresa was restored to a place of honor. She was beatified in 1946.

SPIRITUAL REFLECTIONS

Not Just Any Kind of Prayer

There is a vivid contrast in today’s parable – between the worldly-wise and unscrupulous judge, who is waiting for the usual bribe, and the seemingly inexperienced widow, who has been defrauded of her property after the death of her husband. What is really at issue, however, is the wisdom of the agnostic judge, who lives in the “real world,” and the apparent naivete of the poor widow who is relying on the help of God, in whom she trusts implicitly. The judge trusts in his cleverness; the widow trusts in the God of her prayers.

We must note, however, that it is not just any kind of prayer that will merit a response. Effective prayer in this case is a doggedly persistent and persevering prayer. We are not told how long we must pray in order to finally receive God’s response, but the answer seems to be as long as it takes. One important caveat must be observed: our prayer must be for justice – that is, for the good that God sees in our situation, rather than some illusory goal that is not ultimately in our best interests.

The most perfect prayer of trust is found in those few but emphatic words of Jesus as he confronted his death in the garden of Gethsemane. He asks first of all for the humanly comprehensible liberation from his plight. But his implicit faith in his heavenly Father’s goodness enables him to rise above the merely human plane and to accept his Father’s decision, come what may: “Not my will but yours be done” (Luke 22:42). In a secular, self-centered universe, such a cry will be considered naïve, but in the universe that includes God and a life beyond this one, these words of trust are the most perfect expression of human wisdom and generosity.
