BLESSED AMONG US

Clarence Jordan – Founder, Koinonia Farm (1912-1969) Clarence Jordan was born in rural Georgia and earned ministerial credentials as well as a doctorate in New Testament studies from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville. In 1942, with his wife, Florence, and a couple other families, he founded Koinonia Farm, an experiment in communal Christian living, near Americus, Georgia. *Koinonia* was the Greek word used in Acts to describe the early Church community and its atmosphere of reconciliation and partnership. Jordan believed the most vital need for reconciliation in the South was between blacks and whites. At a time when such talk was considered dangerously radical, Jordan’s views drew a wedge between Koinonia and its neighbors. He was expelled from the local Baptist church. Troubles truly began in the 1950s after the Supreme Court ruling on school desegregation. Koinonia was subjected to shootings, bombings, and vandalism, along with an economic boycott of the community.

Jordan published a vernacular translation of the New Testament called his “Cotton Patch version,” setting the story of Jesus “along the dusty rows of cotton, corn, and peanuts” in rural Georgia. He believed the problems with Christianity stemmed from the fact that most Christians pictured Jesus enthroned in heaven or safely confined to “Bible times,” thus missing the challenge of the incarnation. By glorifying Christ, he wrote, “we more effectively rid ourselves of him” than did those who crucified him. Jordan died on October 29, 1969.

“The good news of the resurrection of Jesus is not that we shall die and go home to be with him, but that he has risen and comes home with us, bringing all his hungry, naked, thirsty, sick prisoner brothers with him.” -Clarence Jordan

SPIRITUAL REFLECTIONS

How Special?

A Pharisee and a tax collector go up to the Temple to pray. It’s a familiar story, and after two thousand years of seeing the Pharisees as the bad guys and the tax collectors as fallen but redeemable, our hearing of this parable is the opposite of what Jesus’ audience would have heard. Tax collectors were among the worst of the worst: think “Terrorist”, “child molester”, and you’ll be close to the mark. The Pharisees could be smug, and Jesus called them out for it. But they were trying to uphold the holiness of Israel, and doing that meant a focus on what made them unique: the Law of Moses. Their motives, like ours, weren’t always pure, but their mission was not a bag thing. When Jesus debates them, mostly it’s an in-house debate.

Yet this Pharisee, like all of us at times, has lost the plot. Our first clues are that he “took up his position,” and then he spoke this prayer to himself”. It’s about him, about his own ego, not about God. The Tax collector, in his spiritual poverty, has an appropriate humility and cries out to God for mercy. We get this: he’s the good guy, and he goes home justified.

But there’s a more subtle reading of this: “I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity...” That strikes even closer to home for me. I certainly want to feel special: unique and precious. But it’s when I realize I’m exactly as special as everyone else on the planet...only then do I arrive at something like justification in God’s eyes.
