BLESSED AMONG US

John Kavanaugh – Jesuit (1941-2012) As a young Jesuit priest, John Kavanaugh went to work with Mother Teresa at her home for the dying in Calcutta. It was a transformative experience. “The most indelible thing about Mother Teresa was her insistence that the greatest need in life is greater trust, that the absence of love is the greatest poverty, and that the Eucharist is not only the center of our worship, but also the center of our concern for the poor.” Those lessons, he later said, were the “three sustaining things in my life.”

A quest for the value and meaning of human life became the central theme in his career as a philosopher and ethicist at St. Louis University, where he taught for thirty-six years. He was a particularly sharp critic of the accommodation of Christian faith to the idols of culture. His book *Following Christ in a Consumer Society* contrasted the soul-destroying aspects of a materialistic society with the personalism of the gospel. The implications of this perspective caused him to challenge the comfortable pieties of both the left and the right. What was needed, he taught, was to recover in Christ the model of what it means to be a human person, fully alive. And to recognize in others the image of God. This was “revolutionary holiness.”

Kavanaugh died after a long illness on November 5, 2012.

SPIRITUAL REFLECTIONS

Never Quite Finished

I can’t remember the last time I climbed a tree. It was once child’s play, but as an adult it’s a bit of a stretch. So, what is Zacchaeus doing out on a limb in Jericho? He’s no kid. He is grown up and wealthy and, even though despised as a tax collector, has a certain status. Short in stature isn’t the whole story. He could have wormed his way to the front of the crowd – it’s a parade move as old as human history.

Luke says Zacchaeus wanted to see who Jesus was. Likely, the stirrings of conversion were already in his heart, so perhaps he also wanted to be seen. But being at the roadside, an arm’s length from this charismatic prophet, might have been a little too close for comfort. Safer to be up a tree where he could check things out. Safer, that is, until Jesus looked up.

Of the many aspects of Zacchaeus’s story, the choice to observe at first from a safe distance is especially resonant. Conversion is uncomfortable and hard and never quite finished. I tend to want detachment from the suffering around me and to reject the idea that I might have extorted anything from anyone. Too often I come up short, reluctant to climb down from my comfortable perch.

But near or far, curbside or tree, doesn’t really matter. Over and again, Jesus looks up and calls me by name.
