SPIRITUAL REFLECTIONS

John August Swanson – Artist (1938-2021) Born in Los Angeles to a Mexican mother and a Swedish father, John August Swanson struggled hard to find his way. A turning point came when he started taking night courses from the great artist Corita Kent. Gradually he mastered the art of silk screens, printmaking, and serigraphs that required the painstaking application of dozens of individual colors. Eventually his work appeared in churches and galleries around the world, including the Vatican and Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles.

Swanson’s art drew on many traditions and styles, including Byzantine icons, medieval illuminations, and Mexican folk art. His themes drew extensively on biblical texts, whether the dream of Jacob, the stories of Ruth or David and Goliath, or the famous text from Ecclesiastes, “For everything there is a season.” Yet for all the complexity and symbolic depth of his work, it was marked by a playfulness and spirit of wonder.

Swanson saw God at play in creation, in the dreamscape of a starry firmament, in the stories of Jesus and the people of God, in acts of solidarity for justice and peace. And it was no wonder that he pivoted easily from images of St. Francis and other saints to jugglers, clowns, and circus performers. St. Francis had called his followers *jongleurs de Dieu* – tumblers, jugglers, acrobats of God – who performed for the Lord, just as Swanson performed through his art, through his vision of a world imbued with color, celebration, and love.

Swanson died on September 23, 2021.

Ingenious

Is this really the Gospel? Is Jesus actually praising a man for being doubly dishonest?

The story can leave us perplexed. Jesus tells of a man who cheated his employer and then, when caught, before being fired, cheated his employer a second time by writing off some of the debts of those who owned the employer money. Moreover, there is an added craftiness to the steward’s actions. Notice that he, himself, doesn’t do the actual deed of cooking the books. He has the master’s debtors do the actual writing so that they are now implicated in the dishonesty. Accordingly, they are now complicit with him in his crime and will owe him favors after he loses his job. And, Jesus praises this! What are we to make of it?

The renowned intellectual Bernard Lonergan once shared that he liked this text because “it’s one place in scripture where human intelligence and ingenuity are praised.” Certainly that’s true, but why would Jesus use an example of dishonesty to do this?

Because what Jesus is praising here is not dishonesty but ingenuity – ingenuity as the antithesis of complaint, whining, and despair. Jesus points out that those who are outside our religious circles tend to be more ingenious in times of trouble than we committed believers, who too often give ourselves over to grumbling and inaction.

I’m with Lonergan in his takeaway from this story: ingenuity is the opposite of complaint and despair.
